QCDD NYS Budget Position 2017-2018 #bFair2DirectCare

OPWDD

- Include \$45 million to allow non-profit providers to begin to increase salaries for direct support professionals and other lower paid staff over a six year period to a living wage
- Support the Governor's proposal adding funds for the development of new services and supports but add \$25 million in additional funding for the development of residential supports for 2000 people with high priority needs who reside at home and need 24 hour residential support
- Include funds for a COLA/Trend for OPWDD services based on the Rate of Medical Inflation rather than the Consumer Price Index

SPECIAL EDUCATION

- Include \$18 million to allow 853 schools and 4410 preschool providers to increase salaries for certified teachers so that they can attract and retain enough qualified teachers to provide federally mandated FAPE to children with the most significant disabilities
- Include a 4% tuition increase for the 2017/18 school year for classroom based 4410 preschools and 853 school age special education approved programs
- Additional UPK seats

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH: EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM &

ARTICLE 16 CLINICS

- Include a 4% increase in the Early Intervention Program reimbursement rates
- Support the Governor's proposal to increase insurance company participation in the Early Intervention program except the requirement that providers appeal rejected insurance claims

Your Child is Entitled to SSI

Caregivers and service providers must carefully research entitlement program choices to ensure their child receives maximum medical, dental, and ancillary benefits. While schools are often a great resource, they may not always be able to provide for specific needs (diapers, camps, respite, sensory items, etc.). Medicaid and Supplemental Income (collectively known as SSI) provided by the Social Security Administration is one way caregivers can attain additional financial support.

Before applying, caregivers are encouraged to either read about Supplemental Security Income on www.ssa.gov or to seek the assistance of a trained Benefit Specialist, to ensure the costs/benefits/requirements all meet their individual circumstances and needs. Once the benefit program is understood, caregivers can apply for SSI at a Social Security Office, over the phone, or through a requested field visit (provided the child applying for SSI has a medical/physical/psychological condition preventing them from attending the office).

Eligibility for SSI is based on the child's caregivers' monthly income, resources (excluding expenditures such as ancillary services and items purchased not covered by Medicaid). Once all documentation is prepared, caregivers can phone their local SSA office at 1-800-772-1213 to arrange an appointment. The SSA requires the following documentation to apply for SSI:

- The child must be under 18 years of age
- The child must have a disability: a medically determinable or physical/mental impairment, which results in marked and severe functional limitations expected to last at least 12 months
- Psychological, psychosocial, and medical evaluations dated within 1 year of SSA application
 - o It is recommended that all doctors/clinicians who have evaluated child sign release forms
 - o If no psychological evaluation exists, Article 16 Clinics in the Queens area will provide free evaluations. Bernard Fineson DDSO (718-217-6485) will also help caregivers locate a local program.
 - It is <u>not</u> advised to <u>only</u> use Department of Education evaluations or to wait for the SSA Disability Review Department to assign an appointment. In order to assure the best services are provided, it is recommended to use as many physicians and clinicians who are already familiar with the child's history
- The following ID/income verification:
 - o The child's birth certificate
 - o The child's social security card
 - $\circ \ Income \ verification \ (pay \ stubs, \ W2, \ and/or \ bank \ statements)$
 - o Insurance policies for all members of the household

The resource limit for a couple is \$3000 and for a single caregiver, \$2000. Income is calculated comparing the number of individuals in the household against household expenditures and medical expenses. For the most accurate calculation, it is recommended that caregivers obtain therapy plans from each clinician/doctor the child's sees, in order to ensure a precise calculation of expenditures (cost of services, prescriptions, additional therapy needs, etc.). All services the child receives should be included, even those that are not an out-of-pocket expense (i.e. therapy paid for by the DOE or the caregivers' insurance). It's important to note that private/commercial insurance can coexist with Medicaid coverage—caregivers need not drop one to obtain the other.

The entire review process usually takes approximately six months. However, a new SSA initiative—called the Presumptive Eligibility Disability Process—allows the applying child to receive benefits 30-60 days after the initial interview, if all medical/psychological/income verification documents are presented during the initial interview. After the initial interview, the Human Resource Administration will send the caregiver a notice asking if they want to enroll in a Medicaid Managed Care program. It is vital the caregiver determine if their child currently participates in an OPWDD program, because certain Medicaid Managed Care programs do not cover OPWDD services. An alternative option is a new Medicaid Managed Care insurance plan (still currently a pilot program), which offers select programs; however, it may not provide the specific services the applying child needs. If SSI is denied after the six month review process, any early funds received through the Presumptive Eligibility Disability Process do not need to be repaid. Caregivers can challenge the denial by applying for a Reconsideration or Fair Hearing. It is also important to note that a caregiver cannot be told their child is ineligible through a phone interview. Everyone has a right to the full application (and reconsideration) process.

QCDD ANNUAL FAMILY SUPPORT CONFERENCE

The annual QCDD Family Support Conference this past October was a booming success. Dozens of vendors presented their services and available networking opportunities to caregivers and individuals. Participation in available workshops throughout the day was high and enthusiastic. Topics ranging from Navigating Across Systems to Bullying Prevention to Benefits and Entitlements were highly attended. Ann Hardiman, Executive Director at NYSACRA, gave a keynote speech before the presentation of the June Marcus Award. Dr. Julian Bower was presented with the award, for his tremendous contribution to the I/DD Community.







MEDICAID ALERT: New Client ID Benefit Card

This is to inform Providers, Client Representatives, Hospitals, Certified Health Agencies, and Community Based Organizations that a newly designed Client Identification Benefit Card is available as of 8/1/16. Existing cards remain valid. Mailed cards will continue to be produced using current CBIC's stock until it is depleted. There will be no mass mailing to replace current cards.
